But isn't it what the readers love. The authors like Nikita Singh provide a momentary joy to the readers who can read their book and forget without even trying to remember anything. The novels are basically written for the youths of today and that's why they have to fuse erotic elements in the novels. So, the novels by Nikita Singh are perfect examples of commercially erotic novels and the author herself is an example of a successful literary entrepreneur who invests her time in writing and rips the monetary returns.

She has written twelve books till date. Readers of Singh's novels have encountered unusual themes in her books. *Right Here, Right Now* is about a woman losing her memory, while *After All This Time* deals with a character who is HIV positive. *Love* @ *Facebook*, is a young adult book about a nineteen-year-old girl, who falls in love with a VJ, after befriending him on Facebook. *Right Here Right Now* follows the new life of an amnesiac in an identity crisis.

Letters To My Ex, studies a broken engagement solely through the written communication that follows. The Reason Is You (2019), explores grief and recovery from loss and the constraints of traditional relationships. Her latest release What Do You See When You Look In the Mirror? (2021), is about the secret inner lives of her characters, as they grapple with love, loss, grief, and mental health.

The novel *The Promise*, explores the complex relationships between three friends who are struggling to come to terms with their pasts. As they get to know each other, they make promises of fulfilling each other's desires. They also promise to fulfil every other promise. Nikita writes, "Promises are meant to be kept, once it is broken, no sorry can compensate for it, everything seems go against you." Similarly, in Every Time it Rains, Singh explores the inner lives of her characters as they navigate the complexities of love and relationships. The novel follows the story of Laila and Jay, two young people who are struggling to find their place in the world. Singh delves deep into their thoughts and emotions, painting a vivid portrait of their inner lives and the challenges they face. The novel represents the story of every girl who has ever had her heart broken and fell in love again. Love is a dangerous thing. It brings with it great joy, and opens you up to pain. But does one really have the courage to say no and look the other way? Laila is yet to recover from her painful past. Nidhi's thoughts and emotions are depicted in a raw and honest manner, making her a relatable and sympathetic character. Nidhi writes

letters to her ex-boyfriend, as a way of processing her feelings and coming to terms with their break-up. She lays bare the pangs of heartbreak and things left unsaid. It explores the aftermath of a break up between two people, Nidhi and Abhay. In a series of letters that Nidhi writes to Abhay, she bares her soul and reveals her innermost thoughts and feelings. These lines appearing in the novel suffice to reveal the underlying thought. "It feels like I'm on autopilot; I have no control over anything. The pain of losing you is so crippling that I can barely hold pieces of myself together. The slightest nudge could break me. But somehow, my possessed brain knows what I need. It's telling me to stick to my choice, to stay away from you, to open a Word document and bleed on paper, try to throw up all my jumbled thoughts in form of words, collect all disconnected facts, try to make sense of it all."

Far from mush, these 20-something urban men and women are pragmatic, career-driven, cynical, full of regrets, though not entirely without hope for a better life or love. "Nikita is perhaps the only female writer in this genre who's able to keep the stories contemporary, build both her male and female characters equally and write books that connect with the youth," adds Mathur, who has worked with her over several books. "The fact that she herself is very young, and therefore knows and connects with her target readers, adds to her profile."

Popular romance writer Nikita Singh has been writing about love for over a decade now. In a session held on October 16, 2021, at the Times Lit fest 2021, the cupid's favourite author talked about her latest book, 'What Do You See When You Look In The Mirror?', with author Harshali Singh. Nikita talked about love and romance, why she writes about it, and the way her writing has changed over time. At the age of 19, Nikita wrote her first book 'Together Forever' and has been evolving as a writer ever since. Being acutely aware of the difference in her work over these years, she believes in the relevance of her writings from different stages in her life. "People often ask me if I would change anything in my old books. Well, I wouldn't because that is how a 19-year-old thought, that's how a 22-year-old thought... And that is just a time capsule to me," Nikita said. Addressing the elephant in the room, Harshali began the discussion with romance, its significance, and the purpose behind writing it. "A lot of books portray women in a way that serves the male character's journey, so romance for me is full of women's voices and women's stories. Of course, there are non-binary authors now, and romance is no longer about a man and a woman - there is more love to go around," Harshali said. While Nikita believes that romance novels are a little piece of an emotional journey that one has with oneself and it helps them escape reality. "At the end, I feel that all fiction novels are about relationships; with self, with others, with the environment that you're in," said Nikita.

Talking about her process of writing, Nikita revealed how she relied mostly on observations, the world around her, and imagination, and not her personal life for stories. She also stated how she abstains from proper research because of her susceptibility towards internalizing others' mannerisms and writing styles, thinking, and planning. She tries to stay away from books that are of a similar kind as hers, but reads voraciously. Speaking of how romance and its portrayal has changed over the years, Nikita talked of the complexity of characters and the progress towards realism that one can witness in fictional romance, which is a much needed, welcome change. Nikita talked of the joy of writing short stories where multiple characters can be created without much following through, leaving more room for variety, unlike novels where a lot of investment is made into the characters. The session ended with the author stating her opinion vis-a-vis love and writing both of which she believes would suffer and eventually fade if they stagnate. "I think it is important to dream, and not let it turn into a nightmare," she summarized. Singh says. "Penguin wanted me to write like all its successful romance writers. They wanted to make a superstar out of me," says Singh. "But I wanted to be an actual writer, a good one."
